A Course for Better Care...

For the first time in a decade and for much of fiscal year 2011, Hebrew Health Care has been involved in a strategic planning initiative. Strategic planning is the process of defining an organization's strategy, and making decisions on allocating its resources to pursue this strategy, including its capital and human resources.

Our strategic planning efforts have led us to focus on four major areas: **providing exceptional service and care, building a 21st century constellation of services, developing a rock solid foundation, and investing in our human resources.**

We recognize that within our plan we must include flexibility and adaptability. While strategic planning may be used to effectively plot an organization's direction, it cannot be used to reliably forecast how the market will evolve. We will begin implementing our plan in fiscal year 2012 and we look forward to sharing our successes with you.



Understanding Your Needs...

Much of 2011 was spent analyzing what our customers and their families want and need from us. We are continually reviewing the locations and methods of delivery of the services we provide.

We've learned that elders want to remain in their homes, without sacrificing their own health and welfare. Connecticut has a large population of elders and there are many service providers from which to choose. We have reviewed what Hebrew Health Care needs to do to respond to their wishes and stay competitive in our field.

We are looking at expanding our community based services. We may need to partner with other organizations to achieve that goal, and we must rely on the latest technology to offer broadened services in an affordable way. With 2012 approaching and with health care reform on the horizon, we are working to develop programs and services that our community desires.

Caring in Our Community...

Early in 2011, Hebrew Health Visiting Nurses moved away from the Abrahms Boulevard campus to a new location in Bloomfield offering many benefits for the agency and the community. Residents of Bloomfield, West Hartford, Windsor and neighboring towns have easier access to the agency, which offers many free health screenings and educational opportunities. Because the agency serves the community outside of Hebrew Health Care's main campus, they enjoy being a part of the very community they serve. A Grand Opening celebration was held in February, and since that time they have broadened their service area to 16 towns within Greater Hartford. As Hebrew Health Hospice is housed at the agency, members of the Visiting Nurses and Hospice staff work closely together. **The Hospice program received a perfect score from the State Department of Public Health in their licensure renewal survey which occurred in the spring.**

Excellence in All We Do...

Hebrew Health Adult Day Services offers older adults a place to gather to enjoy a variety of educational and social activities. Clinical services, such as nursing, care coordination and medication management are also provided. Hebrew Health Care's two centers are located at the Immanuel House in Hartford, and on our main campus on Abrahms Boulevard. We have offered adult day services for nearly 40 years.

Our programs are reviewed by the Connecticut Association of Adult Day Centers and both of our centers received a perfect score on their Peer Review with commendation. In May both Centers participated in an administrative review of the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP). They were noted for their commitment to excellence in ensuring complete compliance with regulations.

Revitalizing Rehab...

In April 2011, the Maximilian E. and Marion O. Hoffman Foundation made a \$50,000 grant to Hebrew Health Care to support renovations to our sub-acute rehabilitation unit. The Hoffman Foundation, established in 1989 and located in West Hartford, has provided funding for many health care facilities in the Greater Hartford community. HHC requested funding for the renovation of our 35-bed sub-acute unit in order to remain competitive in the health care marketplace and to continue providing excellent care and services to people in an environment which is desirable to them.

Some of the renovations HHC will be able to accomplish include upgrading the dining room space to provide a home-style dining environment, new flooring, new TVs and freshened décor, since most of these appointments are original to the 1989 building. We

are grateful to the Maximilian E. and Marion O. Hoffman Foundation for making these much-needed renovations possible.



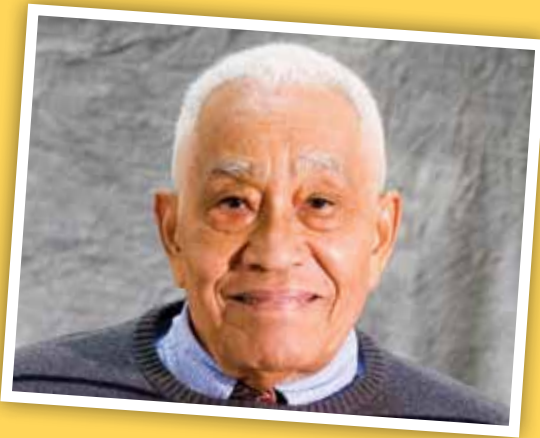
Nourishing Body and Soul...

In April, we partnered with Morrison Dining Services to enhance the dining experience for our residents. **Direct Dining will be offered to improve dining satisfaction by assuring that food temperature, selection process and atmosphere are heightened.** Not only will menu selections be improved, but allowing individuals to make food selections off a menu at the time of food service will provide a more pleasing mealtime. Food service will be advanced not only with staff training and attire, but by offering food items on china and glassware, without tray service.

As a philosophy, Morrison focuses on nutrition and wellness, emerging dining trends, social responsibility and exceptional customer service. Menus are built relying on the freshest ingredients available; creating from scratch foods, alive with flavor and nutrition, using the most wholesome ingredients. Morrison staff are trained that "Great service starts with me!" which they strive for each day.

Broadening Our Reach...

In June 2011, Hebrew Health Assisted Living Services broadened its service area by adding a fifth location in Vernon, Connecticut. HUD sponsored, the Francis J Pitkat Congregate Living Center is a small, 40 apartment senior housing facility. Services offered to residents of the Francis J Pitkat Congregate Living Center include personal care, housekeeping, assistance with medication management, and general wellness visits by a nurse. Since we began service in June we have increased the number of residents from 12 to 17 out of their total 40 apartments and we hope to raise that number.
